Marin Department of Health and Human Services, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), San Francisco Marin Medical Society, and RxSafe Marin are hosting a free training for pharmacists in preventing drug diversion, and furnishing naloxone. This training will cover new tools and resources available to pharmacists to save lives by controlling diversion and helping reverse overdoses.
