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## Community Coalition

OD Free Marin is a community-based, overdose prevention coalition comprised of four action teams and a steering committee. Hundreds of community partners, individuals, organizations, and agencies from across sectors have contributed to the coalition over the past decade. We strive to ensure a coordinated, comprehensive, and collective impact approach to our work. Our priorities are aligned with those of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) to ensure the use of evidence-based strategies as well as innovative and equitable solutions aimed at reducing overdose and increasing the health and wellness of community members throughout Marin County.

## ACTION TEAMS

### Education & Outreach

We focus on spreading awareness of the overdose crisis in the broader community. This includes planning and implementing awareness campaigns; amplifying the work of our partners; and hosting informational presentations and naloxone training – all with a focus on equity, CDPH priorities, and data to inform our work.

### Youth Action Team

We are dedicated to serving young people and uplifting the youth voice. The team is led by youth and supported by adult allies seeking to reduce opioid misuse through prevention, harm reduction and treatment in Marin County.

### Intervention, Treatment & Recovery

We focus on preventing overdose through increasing access to and availability of treatment services, boosting client, provider, and community awareness of resources, and outreach to overdose survivors.



### Justice System

We recognize persons who use drugs often touch the criminal justice system. This team partners with all branches of public safety and justice to enhance prevention programs and protect those most at risk for overdose.

## What is Naloxone?

Naloxone nasal spray (brand name Narcan®) is a life-saving medication that can reverse opioid overdose while having little to no effect on the individual if opioids are not present in their system. Naloxone blocks the opioid receptor sites, reversing the effects of an overdose.

## Recognize the Signs of an Overdose:

Respond quickly, when you observe:

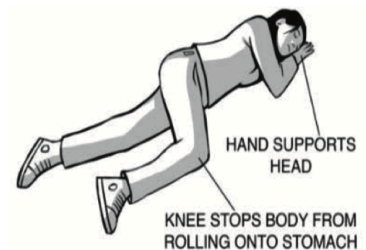
- unresponsiveness
- shallow or no breathing
- slow heart rate
- clammy skin
- tiny pupils
- blue lips/fingertips

## If you think someone is overdosing:

- **CALL 911** (use hands-free speaker phone!)
- Immediately administer naloxone spray, if available:
  - Place applicator in one nostril. Fully press plunger.
  - Roll them on their side if unconscious.
  - Use 2nd dose (in other nostril) if not revived in 2-3 minutes
  - Conduct rescue breaths every 5 seconds if needed



## Naloxone Storage & Expiration

Store naloxone nasal spray in the blister packaging and cartons provided. Store below 77°F (25°C). Do not freeze or expose to excessive heat above 104°F (40°C). Do not store naloxone in your car. Naloxone can still be effective and utilized after the expiration date.

# Fentanyl Test Strips (FTS)

## What are Fentanyl Test Strips?

Fentanyl test strips (FTS) are a low-cost method of helping prevent drug overdoses and reduce harm. FTS are small strips of paper that can detect the presence of fentanyl in different kinds of drugs (cocaine, methamphetamine, heroin, etc.) and drug forms (pills, powder, and injectables). ## Free Fentanyl Test Strips for Eligible Organizations

California Department of Health Care Services recently announced the distribution of free, [all-in-one fentanyl test strip kits](#) to help prevent drug overdoses across the state. The all-in-one fentanyl test strip kits also reduce errors in testing drugs for fentanyl by including clear markings on the water pouch to prevent under and over dilution, and a result guide for test comparison. By providing these free all-in-one kits, DHCS aims to help California communities who are at risk of fentanyl exposure to increase their safety and prevent overdoses. Organizations currently eligible to receive naloxone through the NDP can apply to receive free fentanyl test strip kits through the online application form.

## About MAT

MAT is the use of FDA-approved medications to treat opioid use disorder (OUD) and help individuals sustain recovery. MAT can help manage OUD, much like medication used to treat other chronic conditions such as diabetes and heart disease.

These medications help:

- Reduce or eliminate withdrawal symptoms
- Block the effects of opioids
- Reduce or eliminate cravings for opioids

MAT, combined with counseling and other forms of recovery support, is a complete, whole-person approach to care, and has been proven to be safe and effective for managing OUD.

## Understand the Options

Currently, there are three FDA-approved medications: methadone, buprenorphine, and naltrexone. Each medication is distinct and must follow a specific treatment protocol.

### Methadone

- **Effect:** reduces opioid cravings and controls withdrawal symptoms
- **Dosing:** taken daily by mouth
- **Initiating treatment:** start at a low dose and gradually increase as needed
- **Prescription:** only administered by federally-registered Opioid Treatment Programs

### Buprenorphine

- **Effect:** reduces cravings and controls withdrawal symptoms
- **Dosing:** taken daily by mouth or by injection (weekly/monthly) from a healthcare provider
- **Initiating treatment:** 12-24 hours after last use of opioids
- **Prescription:** doctor's office or an Opioid Treatment Program

### Naltrexone

- **Effect:** blocks the effects of opioids on the body
- **Dosing:** administered monthly by injection from a healthcare provider
- **Initiating Treatment:**
  - 7-10 days after last use of short acting opioids
  - 10-14 days after last use of long-acting opioids
- **Prescription:** doctor's office or an Opioid Treatment Program

## Understanding the CRT Initiative

Expanding local capacity and infrastructure in partnership with public, private, and philanthropic agencies to prepare for, respond to, and recover from, public health threats and emergencies. CRTs have adopted strategies that build coordination across Marin County; with an equity-based approach focused on residents who are most vulnerable to emergencies and who would benefit the greatest from the provision and coordination of services and resources; ensuring that unique community needs drive the collective strategies and solutions used for this initiative; leveraging organizations' strengths and expertise; maintaining flexibility and being adaptive in emergency response; reducing duplication of efforts; developing a replicable model for different hazards and different national regions and areas.
